
Polite Reminder

Year 2 Linden Class visited Ealing Gurdwara. This related to our RE topic of this 'Special Foods'.

At the Gurdwara, Linden class received a talk about what makes the place of worship special to Sikhs and had the opportunity to try some food. As is customary in a Gurdwara, vegetarian food is offered to all visitors. The langar is a large kitchen and eating area where free vegetarian meals are provided. Sikhs volunteer to help with the work of the langar by collecting or preparing the food, serving the meals or washing up.

Some pupils got to serve the langar to the class, this is called seva.




























Cherry Class have been reading the book Stone Age Boy in literacy and learning about what life was like for hunter-gatherers in the Stone Age.







Our finished products- ready to wear on Stone Age dress up day!










Monday 9th September, year 4 had their wow day where they taught their teddy bears for the day.



25th September- Making fans from recycled wrapping paper for the craft fair










26th September Celebrating European Day of Languages - we learnt to count in the different European languages represented in Poplar Class






In year 6 we have been learning all about the human body. We have looked at all the important systems and how they function. There have been practical sessions that demon-

strate the digestive system, focussing on the journey of food through the body and the circulatory system. We even got to get


to grips with how a heart functions!
